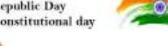

❖ Independence Week

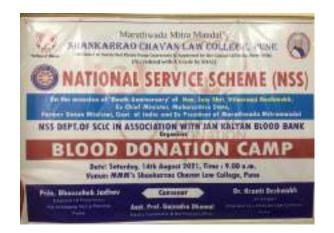




















































* Republic Day

Though India became a free nation on August 15, 1947, it declared itself a Sovereign, Democratic and Republic state with the adoption of the Constitution on January 26, 1950. A salute of 21 guns and the unfurling of the Indian National Flag by Dr. Rajendra Prasad heralded the historic birth of the Indian Republic on that day. Thereafter 26th of January was decreed a national holiday and was recognized as the Republic Day of India. The Constitution gave the citizens of India the power to choose their own government and paved the way for democracy. Dr. Rajendra Prasad took oath as the first President of India at the Durbar Hall in Government House and this was followed by the Presidential drive along a five-mile route to the Irwin Stadium, where he unfurled the National Flag.

College celebrated the day with flag hoisting in the hands of distinguished person followed by address to students and faculties on constitutional values and obligations.

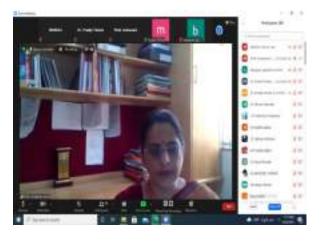
















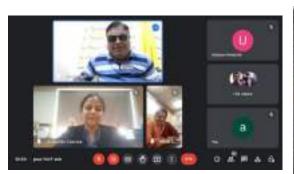
❖ World Braille Day

Eye conditions are remarkably common. The World Health Organization estimates that globally, at least 1 billion people have a near or distance vision impairment that could have been prevented or has yet to be addressed. Persons with vision impairment are more likely than those without to experience higher rates of poverty and disadvantage. Not meeting their needs, or fulfilling their rights, has wide-reaching consequences: vision loss often represents a lifetime of inequality, poorer health, and barriers to education and employment.

The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, adopted in 2006, has advanced the rights and well-being of persons with disabilities. The Convention considers Braille essential for education, freedom of expression and opinion, access to information and social inclusion. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, adopted in 2015, further pledges that no one will be left behind in the aim to ensure that all human beings can enjoy prosperous and fulfilling lives. In November 2018 (Resolution A/RES/73/161), the General Assembly decided to proclaim 4 January as World Braille Day, recognizing that the full realization of human rights and fundamental freedoms relies on an inclusive written promotion.

On the occasion of World Braille Day, college has organized a Webinar on 'Right to Reasonable Accommodation and Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities in the Domain of Education' with the objective to help sensitizing students over the accessibility of the disabled, particularly in India and the challenges faced by them, in their day-to-day life.

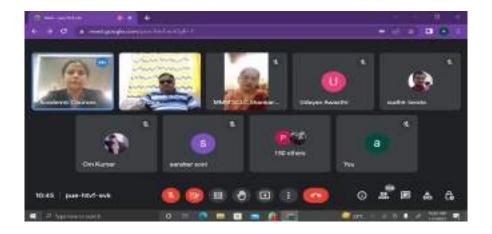

Human Rights Week on the occasion of International Human Rights Day

Human Rights Day is observed by the international community every year on 10 December. It commemorates the day in 1948 the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The formal inception of Human Rights Day dates from 1950, after the Assembly passed resolution 423 (V) inviting all States and interested organizations to adopt 10 December of each year as Human Rights Day. When the General Assembly adopted the Declaration, it was proclaimed as a "common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations", towards which individuals and societies should "strive by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance". The Universal Declaration of Human Rights sets out a broad range of fundamental rights and freedoms to which all of us are entitled. It guarantees the rights of every individual everywhere, without distinction based on nationality, place of residence, gender, national or ethnic origin, religion, language, or any other status.

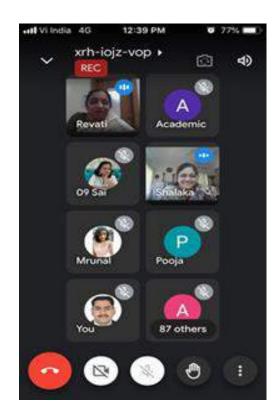

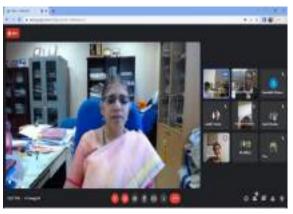


***** World Intellectual Property Day

❖ International Yoga Day

Recognizing its universal appeal, on 11 December 2014, the United Nations proclaimed 21st June as the International Day of Yoga by resolution 69/131. The draft resolution establishing the International Day of Yoga was proposed by India and endorsed by a record 175 member states. The proposal was first introduced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in his address during the opening of the 69th session of the General Assembly, in which he said: "Yoga is an invaluable gift from our ancient tradition. Yoga embodies unity of mind and body, thought and action ... a holistic approach that is valuable to our health and our well-being. Yoga is not just about exercise; it is a way to discover the sense of oneness with yourself, the world and the nature."

All the teaching, Non-teaching staff of College and students had participate in the 'International Yoga day'. Celebration of Birth Anniversary of Annabhau Sathe and Death Anniversary of Lokmanya Tilak

Annabhau Sathe, whose birth anniversary falls on August 1, wrote 35 novels, 13 collections of short stories and a few plays grounded in realism. He also wrote street plays, a travelogue and songs and *lavanis* (a dance form that has contributed significantly to Marathi folk theatre), which created a storm in Maharashtra.

Bal Gangadhar Tilak was a social reformer, Indian nationalist, and freedom fighter. He was a follower of Swaraj and died on 1 August 1920. His speeches in Marathi and Hindi were popular. He helped in laying the foundation for India's independence against Britishers and converted it into a national movement. He is credited as the first leader of the Indian Independence Movement. He was lovingly called 'Lokmanya' which means 'accepted by people'. Bal Gangadhar Tilak was the foremost and most active leader of the Indian freedom struggle and is known for paving the way for subsequent leaders like Mahatma Gandhi and Sardar Vallabhai Patel.

To celebrate the memories of both of these great personalities; the book display was arranged in the college library.

Jyotirao Govindrao Phule, commonly known as Mahatma Jyotiba Phule, is a pioneer in the field of women's education. He was a humanitarian, author, philosopher, and revolutionary who fought societal problems for a long time. He was born on April 11, 1827, in Maharashtra, and is noted for speaking out against caste inequality. His contribution to the education of girls and the empowerment of women was enormous.

Jyotiba Phule advocated for widow remarriage and established a home for lower and upper caste widows in 1854. He also opened a shelter for new-born infants to combat female infanticide. By opening his home and allowing people of the lower castes to use his water well, Jyotiba Phule attempted to remove the stigma of social untouchability that surrounded the lower castes.

College has arranged a Programme to commemorate death anniversary of Krantisurya Mahatma Phule on $28^{\rm th}$ November in the LIBRARY.

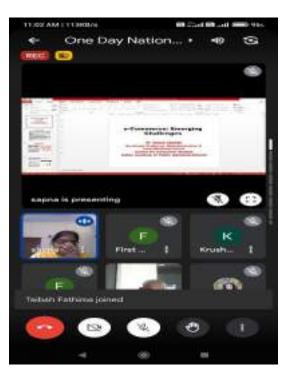
❖ National Consumer Rights Day

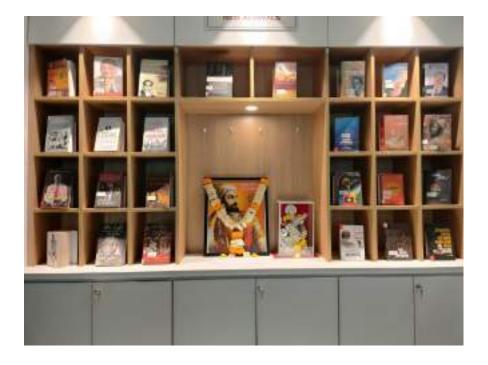
















❖ International Day of Girl Child

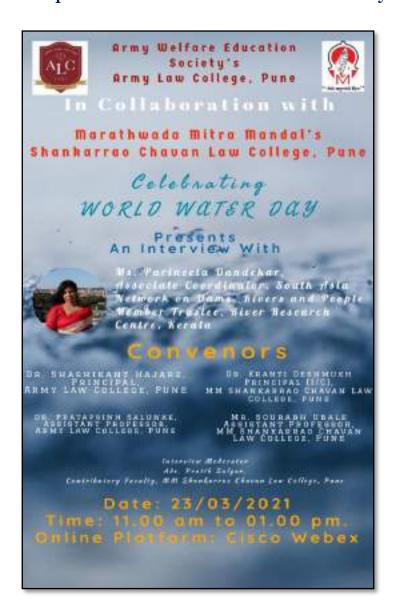


❖ World Water Day

The year 1972 marked a turning point in the development of international environmental politics: the first major conference on environmental issues, convened under the auspices of the United Nations, was held from June 5-16 in Stockholm (Sweden). Known as the Conference on the Human Environment, or the Stockholm Conference, its goal was to forge a basic common outlook on how to address the challenge of preserving and enhancing the human environment. Later that year, on 15 December, the General Assembly adopted a resolution (A/RES/2994 (XXVII)) designating June 5 as World Environment Day and urging "Governments and the organizations in the United Nations system to undertake on that day every year world-wide activities reaffirming their concern for the preservation and enhancement of the environment, with a view to deepening environmental awareness and to pursuing the determination expressed at the Conference." The date coincides with the first day of the landmark Conference.

Students of our college have celebrated World Environment Day by having tree plantation drive to spread awareness about the threat to the environment due to rising pollution levels and climate change.

Hon'ble Late Shri Shankarrao Chavan National Legislative Drafting Competition:

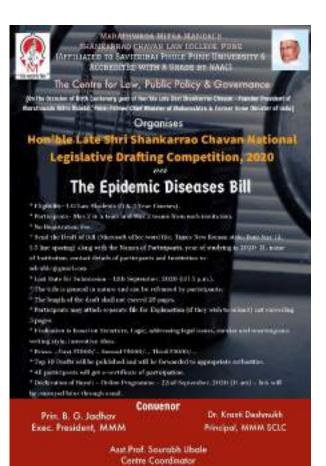

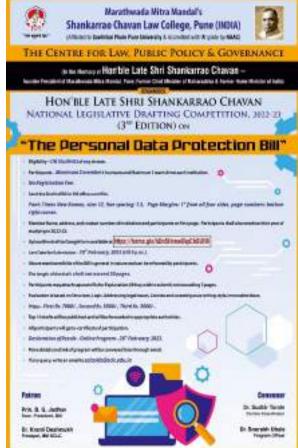

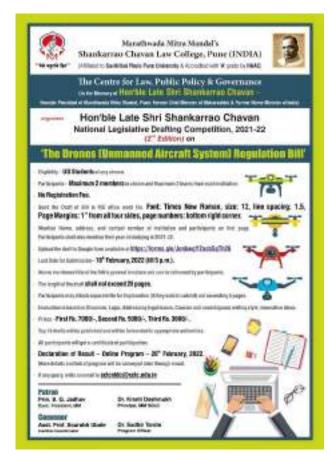
